The Personal Insurance Federation of California, representing insurers who write 44% of the auto insurance sold in the state, including Farmers, 21st Century, Safeco, Progressive, State Farm and NAMIC, supports Assembly Bill 2108 by Assemblymember Noreen Evans.

PIFC and its member companies have a long history of support for sound public safety measures that serve to reduce injuries and enhance public safety. In fact, one of our members, State Farm, has been involved in a partnership with Children's Hospital of Philadelphia since 1999. The partnership, Partners for Child Passenger Safety (PCPS) is the world's largest study of children in crashes. In 2005 they published their first report, Partners for Child Passenger Safety Fact and Trend Report (http://www.statefarm.com/kidsafety/pdfs/trauma report.pdf). The report provides updated facts and trends about children involved in U.S. motor vehicle crashes from 1999 through 2004.

Motor vehicle crashes remain the leading cause of death for children between the ages of 2 to 14 years in the United States. In 2002, 227,000 children were injured and 1,543 children were killed in car crashes. (Source: National Highway Traffic Safety Administration) For decades, safety advocates have stressed the importance of using car seats, booster seats and seat belts for children riding in motor vehicles. Yet, motor vehicle crashes remain the leading cause of death and disability in children over age 1 in the United States.

There are precautionary measures parents can take to ensure that their children are riding safely in vehicles. When used correctly, child restraints effectively reduce the risk of death and serious injury in a crash. AB 2108 would update the current child passenger safety laws to reflect the current research on child passenger safety.
